


Traditional Binary Gender Model

- Sexual Orientation






Revolutionary Gender Model

Gender identity is how you, in your head, think about yourself. It's the chemistry that composes you (e.g., hormonal levels) and how you interpret what that means.

Gender expression is how you demonstrate your gender (based on traditional gender roles) through the ways you act, dress, behave, and interact.

Biological sex refers to the objectively measurable organs, hormones, and chromosomes. Female = vagina, ovaries, XX chromosomes; male = penis, testes, XY chromosomes; intersex = a combination of the two.

Sexual orientation is who you are physically, spiritually, and emotionally attracted to, based on their sex/gender in relation to your own.



Trans*/Transgender Someone who does not identify with their sex assigned at birth

Transfeminine/Transmasculine Someone who identifies more female than male or more male than female

Trans Man/Trans Woman Someone who was female at birth but identifies as male/someone who was male at birth but identifies as female

Agender Someone who does not identify with a gender

Two Spirit Someone who fills one of the many mixed-gender roles prevelant in Native American communities

Multigender Someone who identifies with more than one gender (e.g. bigender)

Gender Fluid Someone whose gender changes

Genderqueer Someone who does not identify within the gender binary

Identities Not Under The Trans* Umbrella:

Cisgender Someone who is not trans*

Drag Performer

Someone who wears flamboyant clothes for entertainment value (can be trans*)

Crossdresser

Someone who wears clothes assosciated with the a different gender (can be trans*)

Intersex

The presence of a less common combination of biological features that generally distinguish male and female (can be trans*)

Trans* Allyship

- Don't ever out a trans* person. This is dangerous to their safety & can invalidate their identity
- Always use the pronouns & name the person wants you to use. If you're unsure, ASK! If you make a mistake, correct yourself, & correct others if they use the wrong pronoun.
- Don't confuse gender with sexual orientation. Trans* individuals like Cisgender people, are straight, gay, bisexual, pansexual, asexual, etc. Gender is not tied to sexual preference, & there are a million ways to express desire.
- Don't assume the only way to transition is through hormones/surgery. Understand that medical transition is very often based on economic status.




Trans* Allyship

- Don't let transphobia slide. Confront it as you would confront all other forms of oppression

Above all respect and support trans* individuals in their lives and choices




Gender is one of those things everyone thinks they understand, but most people don't. Gender isn't binary. Gender's not even a spectrum or a continuum. Gender is a complex concept of n-dimensions that varies wildly from person to person. The only way to understand a person's gender is to ask them.



Intersectionality

- Almost 90% of all homicide victims in 2013 were people of color, yet LGBTQ and HIVaffected people of color only represented 55% of total survivors and victims
- The overwhelming majority of homicide victims, 78%, were Black and African American
- 11% of homicide victims were Latina, and 11% of homicide victims were white
- Almost three-quarters (72%) of homicide victims were transgender women
- More than two-thirds (67%) of homicide victims were transgender women of color
- Transgender survivors and victims only represent 13% of total reports to NCAVP
- In 2013, 27.78% of homicide victims were men, all of whom identified as gay
